

- Overnight, Iceland's whole banking system crumbled as all major banks went bankrupt
- Our currency, the krona, crashed.
- There were upsides
- Benefits or low income
- Lost their jobs and their life savings

- Iceland was the second country in the world to refuse to do so



Pot & Pan revolution

- Widespread effects on people's lives
- Protesters were from all walks of life, young and old.

Unemployment

- Unemployment rose sharply
- Before the crisis there had been a shortage of man power
- Iceland now has the largest number of first generation immigrants of all the Nordic countries

Unemployment

- Unemployment measured 1% in 2007 and rose to 9%
- Young, unskilled people has been very hard hit.
- Unemployed for a longer period of time, is fast increasing

Those worst off and government response

- Those that were poor before the crisis did not feel the effect of the crisis so much, to begin with.
- Single parents and families with many children are worst hit.
- Hitting hardest those with disabilities and long term illnesses.

Those worst off and government response

- Municipalities have increased their social support
- Families with mortgages on their housing
- Population are in a serious default situation

Concerted effort

- At the beginning of the crisis there was a great sense of unity
- Difference in salaries between men and women became very obvious
